Please mark your calendar for this year's annual meeting which is next Sunday, May 5th at 9:00 in the Fellowship Hall. The constitution requires 50 voting members to reach quorum, so please make every effort to attend.

## General Operating Net Income Update and Appeal:

Thank you for the additional giving many of you sent in December through March in response to our appeal to meet Bethlehem's planned expenses. Thank you also for your recent pledges. Our current pledges now exceed last year's pledges, which is a very good thing to see. As we explained in previous Blaze articles, we need offerings of $\$ 31,913$ per month ( $\$ 7,365$ per week) to meet budgeted expenses, most of which are fixed expenses. Because of less giving in September, October, and November, our income fell behind and your generosity in December, January, February and March helped, but we are still tracking \$33,000 BELOW for net income for the current fiscal year which ends June 30,2024. Expenses are now running
$\$ 22,000$ over expected budgeted figures with much of that due to a recent roof repair.

You may recall ERTC (Employee Retention Tax Credit), a tax credit for businesses who retained all employees during the COVID-19 pandemic, did provide Bethlehem with $\$ 50,191$ with another $\$ 4,000$ expected. However, this is a one-time credit that will not provide ongoing income.

## Ascension of Our Lord

Forty days after the Resurrection of Our Lord, according to the Acts of the Apostles, Jesus gathered his disciples in Jerusalem and "was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight" (Acts 1:9). The event has been celebrated as one of the festivals in the church since at least the fourth century CE.
Because it is celebrated forty days after Easter, the festival of the Ascension always falls on the Thursday between the fifth and sixth Sundays of Easter.

This year, the Ascension of Our Lord falls on 9 May. We will celebrate with a Service of Holy Communion that night at 7:00 pm.

## Liturgical Shields

In 1945, Pastor Don Elder created two shields decorated with liturgical symbols--one for the Epiphany of Our Lord, and one for Reformation Sunday. He organized an Ecclesiastical Arts Group in 1949 and proposed decorating the entire ceiling of the sanctuary with similar shields to represent every Sunday, Principal Festival, and Lesser Festival celebrated in the church year at that time. Pastor Elder designed two series of shields (essentially the church year twice), 130 shields in total, and the EAG painted them, completing the project in 1952.

The shields don't always correspond to particular lectionary readings of the day, but they do draw on the themes for the seasons and incorporate symbols related to them. Each series runs from the top row to the bottom, from the front of the nave to the back.

These shields correspond to the Sundays and festival days of April \& May this year in the South series:
5 May 2024: Sixth Sunday of Easter - "The Vine", white
The Lord declares in John 15:1 that He is the true vine. The vine also represents the Holy Eucharist.

9 May 2024: Ascension of Our Lord -"The Ascension", white The fiery chariot of Elijah has long been a symbol of Christ's ascension.

12 May 2024: Seventh Sunday of Easter -"Alpha - Mu - Omega", white The banner with these Greek monograms refers to Hebrews 13:8, "Jesus is the same yesterday, today, and forever."

14 May 2024: Matthias, Apostle -"St. Matthias", red
Chosen to replace Judas as one of the twelve disciples, this apostle's symbol is a book representing his gospel overlapped by a double bladed
ax, the instrument of his death.

19 May 2024: Day of Pentecost —"Flames of Fire", red Pentecost is represented by seven flames of the Holy Spirit that descended upon Christ's believers.

26 May 2024: The Holy Trinity —"Shield of the Holy Trinity", white This circle and band motif was used in the Middle Ages to express the doctrine of equality, unity, and separateness of the triune God. The central circle is inscribed "Deus" (God) with three radiating arms inscribed "est" (is) connecting three equal sized circlies inscribed "Father", "Son", and "Holy Spirit". Outer bands that connect the three circles are inscribed "non est" (is not).

31 May 2024: Visit of Mary to Elizabeth

## Ask The Pastor

Q: When is it appropriate to make the sign of the cross, both in and out of service? When is it not?

A: Making the sign of the cross on one's body is one of the most ancient signs and practices of the church. Its origin is in the sacrament of Holy Baptism. In our current practice, after a person is baptized with water, "the presiding minister marks the sign of the cross on the forehead of each of the baptized. Oil prepared for this purpose may be used. As the sign of the cross is made, the minister says: '(Name), child of God, you have been sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever.'" Every sign of the cross made afterward is a reminder of that first mark given in our baptisms.

Originally, the sign of the cross was done as it is done in Holy Baptism: you'd use your thumb or a finger and "trace" the invisible sign of the cross still on your forehead to remind you it was there. Many people still make
the sign of the cross this way. Later, the sign grew into a movement that covered more of the body.

Two variations of the fuller movement are in use. In Western Christianity, the sign is most often made with the two middle fingers of the right hand held together, and touches four or five areas in sequence: the forehead, the lower chest, the left shoulder, and the right shoulder (and sometimes over the heart). In Eastern Christianity, the sign is most often made with the thumb and first two fingers of the right hand held together, and the sequence is: the forehead, the lower chest, the right shoulder, and the left shoulder.

Now, when is it appropriate to make the sign of the cross? Anytime! Around the year 200 CE, Tertullian wrote: "In all our travels and movements, in all our coming in and going out, in putting on our shoes, at the bath, at the table, in lighting our candles, in lying down, in sitting down, whatever employment occupies us, we mark our forehead with the sign of the cross." He also wrote, "We Christians wear out our foreheads with the sign of the cross" because they made it so many times during the day. Martin Luther encouraged every Christian to make the sign of the cross first thing in the morning after waking up, and as the last thing they did before falling asleep as a reminder that they were baptized and beloved children of God.

It can be made at any time when one is praying. It can be made any time someone wants to remind themselves that they are loved by God. It can be made as a sign of comfort when afraid. It can be made to bless things and people. Parents can make the sign of the cross on their children's foreheads to remind them of their baptisms. There is no limit to the use of the sign of the cross, except of course, using it for evil purposes-that would be the only "inappropriate" use of the sign.

We are also invited to make the sign of the cross in our public worship. During the celebration of the Holy Communion, the sign is most often made:

- During the Invocation at the very beginning of worship.
- During the words of absolution at the end of the Confession and Forgiveness.
- During the Blessing at the end of worship.

At these three points in our bulletins, we print a small cross as reminder that the sign of the cross can be made here.

There are other traditional times the sign of the cross can be made in the celebration of the Holy Communion:

- When the words "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord" are sung during of the "Holy, Holy, Holy" hymn.
- At the announcement of the reading of the Gospel, when the sign of the cross is made three times: once on the forehead, once on the lips, and once over the heart.
- During the recitation of the Nicene Creed at the phrase, "and the life of the world to come."
- Any time the name of the Holy Trinity ("Father, Son, and Holy Spirit") or the name of Jesus is used.

During services of Daily Prayer, it's customary to make the sign of the cross at the beginning when the Holy Trinity is invoked and at the end during the Blessing.

The sign of the cross is also made during special worship services: on the forehead of the newly baptized, on the forehead of the sick during prayers for healing, stretched with cords over the area a new church building is to be built, and as part of the Welcome to Baptism.

Other traditions make the sign of the cross at other times during certain worship services, but again, there's never an inappropriate time to make it.

So whenever you feel the urge to make the sign of the cross-during worship or outside of it--go ahead! Whether you make it on your forehead or over your body, whether you pray out loud or silently, whether you just need to be reminded that God is with you, the sign of the cross is available any time, at any place, you need it.
